PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Redeemer family,

On Sunday, Jan 21, we enjoyed blessing our confirmation students and their Faith Mentors at our 10:15 worship service. Each one put their hands into the baptismal font



while I read a blessing over them. Then they each took a stone inscribed with a word (faith, hope, love, etc.) from out of the water to keep and use in private prayer. This dedication was designed to help both mentors and students understand that their Baptism is more than an initiation or simple ritual that happened long ago. Our baptisms are really a reservoir of spiritual gifts that we can draw from as we go through our lives. No matter what you are going through at any time in your life, you can find the gifts of the Holy Spirit at your fingertips when you recall with gratitude the truth of your Baptism--that God loves you unconditionally and is always helping form in you the trust in His grace that you need to live a life worthy of that love.

As I meditated afterwards on the ritual that day, and thought about the font that we use for Baptism, and the number of people over the years who have been baptized in that font, I marvelled at how many blessings God sends into the world year after year as we bring loved ones to that font to be baptized. The very font that we use today was dedicated to the memory of Emeline Shufeldt in 1915! Think about all the people whom Redeemer has been blessed to baptize over the 109 years that we have been using that font! And how many blessings have those so baptized called upon in their own lives, and how many blessings from that baptism have those people shared in the world with other people? Regardless of how "religious" those baptized ones have remained, the blessings of God flow through them best when they act like Jesus towards others. The baptisms themselves are really the outward sign of the truth of God's love that all those blessings are based on. So, we best facilitate the spread of God's blessings by remembering our own baptisms all the time and humbly seeking to teach each other that God's love in Jesus Christ is abundant and free-flowing!

As I meditated on all this blessing, I gave thanks to God for the ministry of Redeemer over its 157 years, and for the members who continue to make this ministry possible. Yes, we have a wonderful legacy in the faith, one that stretches deep into the past, and we thank God that we are in a position to keep sharing those blessings with others by using the time, talent, and resources we have. Let us continue to pray and plan for the coming year's ministries so that we may continue to participate in the great outpouring of grace that God gives to the world through the presence of Christ in the Holy Spirit. A big Thank You to our Redeemer family! Our 2023 Stewardship Campaign for 2024, "Lead With Love", saw 77 Members pledge for a total of \$202,196. If you remember, the 2022 campaign for 2023 garnered 75 Pledges for \$174,611. This shows an increase of \$23,288! As we reported at the Annual Meeting on Jan 28, we are grateful for all of your prayerful support and generosity! God is good!

Frequently Asked Question: When I make a pledge, how does it help Redeemer?

Your pledge during the annual campaign each year is VERY important to the work and planning of the church. We hope each giver can meet their pledge by the end of the calendar year, but your pledge is not binding. The money you give from your pledge is counted towards the support of Redeemer's staff, ministries, and property. Money you choose to give to our "Ministry Partners" is NOT considered part of your pledge to support Redeemer. So, for example, if you give a total of \$1000 to Redeemer for the year and direct the Financial Secretary to send \$250 of that money to ELCA World Hunger or St. Stephan's Grace (for ex.), then your pledge to Redeemer is really \$750. Of course, the entire \$1000 is tax deductible. We are thankful that YOU, our entire congregation, help take care of our church with your three T's -Time, Talent, and Treasure.

An update from Daudi

My four hosts decided we should split up. Two set off to a farm that they guessed was about a 30-minute walk ahead. The driver, Abraham, and I stayed with the vehicle, continuing to try to free the diff that had run aground, but with the wrong tools (we had wrenches, a jack, and a tire iron, but needed a shovel or a pick-axe).

In the two hours that we were stuck, not a person or any other mammal had passed. Just birds and insects above the scrub and the sorghum stalks that look almost like corn, doused in warm early morning light.



After eventually getting the vehicle free, in stages, we started down the road. Then the driver took a right turn into the fields, mowing down sorghum stalks whose grain made a splashing sound hitting the windshield like beads on a tile floor. As we went, Abraham stood tall out the window to get a better look, trying to find any sign of our colleagues.

We found them in a little clearing in the fields. There was a short acacia tree, an ancient tractor, a small pond lined with bushes, and a hut. Our colleagues were there with the farm's caretaker, having a cup of tea in the shade of the tree. The caretaker, a thin man who looked about 50 wearing a white vest, made tea for the rest of us while they showed me different sorghum plants nearby – contrasting healthy ones with macronutrient-deficient ones.

I wondered why my hosts wanted to show me this place. It is a sorghum field that looks like every other sorghum field. If you are from the American Midwest, maybe you can imagine visiting friends in Iowa who wanted to drive a couple of hours to show you a cornfield.

But it was their field. My hosts were our ecumenical partners in the Episcopal Church of South Sudan. They had been given land to cultivate, and they were proud of it. It was 1,000 acres, and so far they had 250 acres in production. In a country where most agriculture is only for subsistence, farming on this scale is novel and could be transformational for a church to have a local source of income to help them achieve their diakonal dreams – things like subsidizing school fees for those who can't pay the tuition of \$83 dollars per semester at the diocese's secondary school nearby in Renk town, and paying teachers better salaries.

They were proud of their accomplishment - farming 250 acres, and of having a vision for farming the remaining 750 acres. That vision was worth the ride.

MUSIC NOTES

Then Sings my Soul

I often get comment like – "I'd love to sing in the choir, but I don't read music." My reply is always, reading music is nice but not necessary. Come anyway. Reading music allows you a short-cut to learning a choir piece. By reading music, you can translate the written music on a page directly into sounds in your ears. From there it's an easy step to reproducing those sounds with your voice. But reproducing sounds with your voice is what music is all about. And that's what we learn to do in choir rehearsal. If you don't read music, you'll

listen to your part a few times and then - you've got it! Learning the music is what rehearsal is all about. Whether you learn it by reading first or listening first it all leads to the same place.

So what does go on in choir rehearsal? Well, let's start with the purpose of rehearsing – we have two goals. 1) to learn the music so we can confidently and accurately reproduce what the composer put down on paper for us, and, 2) to interpret the composer's meaning – the message he/she wrote the piece to express. Generally, we learn to sing the music accurately first and then work out the nuances of the means that we want to share with you on Sunday morning. Making all this happen takes some time and several practices. Only when we're satisfied that a piece is sounding good to us do we sing it on Sunday for you.

So, reading music is a good thing, but it's not the most important thing about singing with the choir. We learn pieces together during rehearsal. And keep working on them until we can sing them the way we want you to hear them. Come join us.Rehearsals Wednesday evenings at 7:30P in the Sanctuary.

She has volumtered with the Boy Scouts, Ramsey Ambulance, ther church and the Junior Women's Club. She is a board member of the Ramsey Soccer Association, as well as the registrar, volumteer coordinator and committee member for BSA froop 31. The Ramsey School District Board of Education is pleased to velcome two new members to the beard: Steve McKnight and Mike Augello. They are longtime residents of the borough, both graduates of Ramsey High School, with children enrolled in the school district. McKnight and Augello will join the board as two members, Andrea Lamendola and Rajph Caputo, did not file for re-election. Thank you to those who helped take down the outdoor nativity scene on January 6th. It was a big help to get it put away before the snow storm.


