

Dear Redeemer members,

As we enter the Advent Season and the four Sundays leading up to Christmas, we hear the words of the prophet Isaiah in a new way. "Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God...". In a world turned upside down by a global pandemic, by political turbulence at home and abroad, and extreme climate records being broken left and right, Christians enter the hopeful season of Advent looking for some real hope.

Greetings Carol, and Redeemer Ramsey!

How are you? Are you holding up okay during these chaotic times?

As for life in Rwanda, things have mostly settled into a new normal. Though the YAGM program was postponed this year, my work here continues alongside the church, especially assisting with the English-speaking congregation and supporting the work of the head office in whatever way is most helpful at this time. My YAGM colleagues and I are also focusing this year on a lot of the structural components of the program, re-evaluating our shared work and how we do that work together to accomplish the goals of the program.

Rwanda overall took a very aggressive and proactive stance in defending itself against the pandemic. In mid-March, the first case of the virus was detected and within 1 week we were put into a complete lock-down. Only essential movement was allowed at that time which included purchasing food, receiving medical treatment, and farming in personal fields. That lasted from March 22 until mid-May when we were able to leave our homes, though still with quite stringent restrictions. Every two weeks, the President meets with the Cabinet and re-evaluates the directives put in place and issuing new orders either lifting restrictions or putting new ones in place.

As of now, churches are for the most part unable to open for worship. We were given orders to prepare for potential re-opening by building washing stations and having cleaning supplies and social distancing measures in place. Though we have met all requirements, as of now the Kigali Lutheran Parish has not been approved to re-open. In fact, only a handful of churches in Kigali have received that approval from the local government as they have taken a very staggered approach to re-opening churches in order to observe how re-openings may affect the spread of the virus. Lutheran churches in three of the larger towns outside of Kigali have been allowed to reopen for worship though, so that was exciting news.

As for the worshipping community of the Kigali Parish, the English-speaking congregation has been able to continue gathering on Sundays using WhatsApp voice messages as our medium of sharing the service. (Zoom or other meeting platforms would not be accessible for all congregation members, so we determined WhatsApp (a texting platform similar to iMessage) was the best option.) We have been worshipping this way since March. I know a few other congregations of the Lutheran Church of Rwanda have taken different approaches to ministering to their congregations (one sending Bible reflections through WhatsApp, another leading worship and prayer services over Zoom for individuals with the capacity to join), but I do not have a full sense of how that has been happening across the country. The head office has been working diligently to meet government requirements for churches and programs to continue as best as possible given the new circumstances of the pandemic.

As for Rwanda on the whole, the nation is managing quite well at this point in time. Though the numbers did spike a bit in June (with roughly 200 new cases a day over the course of a week or two that led to very strict measures and moving the 9pm curfew to a 7pm curfew), we are now back to a place where the number reflect similar numbers to the very early days of the

pandemic. For daily updates on how the country is doing in terms of numbers of new infections, total infections, recoveries, and deaths, you can access that data at <https://rbc.gov.rw>. Daily they put out an infographic report in English, French, and Kinyarwanda. As of yesterday, the numbers are as you see below. Note that the numbers in parentheses are the numbers specifically for the 24-hour period of October 13th. The numbers to the left of the numbers in parentheses are the total numbers since the beginning of the pandemic.

Overall, the country seems to be bouncing back from the worst of the economic challenges it faced during the complete lockdown. During that time, people struggled to get food and resources for daily living, but the government and local organizations that worked with the government were able to provide emergency rations to the most vulnerable. The church also sought ways to share assistance with pastors, their families, and their parishioners who were most vulnerable. Though we won't know the long-lasting impact on the economy for some time, it seems the general population has once again found stable ground.

While it is still a challenging time (especially as schools and most churches remain closed), I have been very impressed with the people's resilience. Life carries on in new ways (strict measures are in place so that everyone is required to wear masks and expected to keep physical distance as best as possible), but somehow the caseload has remained quite minimal for a nation that is only the size of the state of Maryland yet has a dense population of over 12+ million people. Thanks be to God!

As for the needs of the church and the congregations, I am not too privy as to how the pandemic has impacted daily livelihood outside of isolating communities from their places of worship. Please do pray for the communities that have not yet been able to regather and worship together in any way. Also keep in prayer all children, teachers, and families as school re-openings, while exciting, may also become a financial challenge after the economic hardships caused by the pandemic.

Sustainable resources remain a big need for the LCR, and the leaders of the church are working diligently to create and maintain sustainability projects and programs even in the midst of the pandemic. Please share your prayers for this work as it continues. If you'd like to learn more, I'll be happy to communicate with the head office here to hear their thoughts and point you to more specific ways of supporting the LCR through the work of the ELCA's global mission unit.

I hope this small update is helpful and can offer some insight in how things are going these days from my perspective. Please let me know if any more information may be helpful as you prepare your mailing.

Thank you for keeping me and our companions in Rwanda in your prayers!

Dear sisters and brother at The Lutheran Church of the Redeemer,

St. Stephan's Grace Community continues to be a lifeline for many in our community. We know that the ministry here in Newark only exists and prospers due to the generosity of many. We would like to extend our gratitude to all of you at The Lutheran Church of the Redeemer for your continuing prayers and support.

Last year, St. Stephan's Grace Community played a significant role in the response to Newark's water crisis. For several months, we distributed water and water filters to those in need on a weekly basis. Together with a community partner, we are reimplementing this campaign as the problem persists in certain areas. We are currently hosting a water box, a portable filter system that allows people to access clean water by refiling reusable water jugs on designated days. Due to COVID, we had stopped in-person worship services in March and started them up again just in September. For September, we set up our worship space in the backyard. We finally reentered the sanctuary in October. Last Sunday was our second service inside. We still continue services online for those unable to attend in person.

During the pandemic, St. Stephan's Grace Community has been serving all residents in the Ironbound section of Newark, NJ. We have been feeding hundreds of families on a weekly basis. Distributing grocery bags or fresh fruit and vegetables, including some from our own community garden. We have given out thousands of bags of food from purchased and donated groceries through our own church efforts and by hosting community organizations and food pantries. St. Stephan's Grace Community continues to be a beacon of light providing for those in need. We are praying, planning, and working to extend our ongoing feeding ministry. Attached find some pictures of the feeding ministry.

Beyond these emergency efforts we are also spending some energy in maintaining our building in good shape. We had a partial ceiling collapse in the church stairways back in April and we are anxiously taking first steps towards a project to paint the steeple and outside woodwork, which is also a scary process to embark due to the limited resources available.

To these ends, our ministry depends on the work of members and volunteers and the support of its members, friends, partners, and the local community. Thank you for your participation in this journey.




Several Redeemer youth and Pastor Linderman participated in the NJSynod Youth Retreat on Nov 20 and 21, 2020.


First Holy Communion for our 5th graders!




Watch on Facebook...WITHOUT Facebook!



OPTION A. The Tithe.ly Giving App: Click on the GREEN “Give Now” button on our website. You'll be directed in setting up your payment.

OPTION B. Download the Tithe.ly App from the [App Store](#) (iPhone) or [Google Play Store](#) (Android). Once you've downloaded the app select your church and follow the same steps as above.

- Since this is your first time giving with [Tithe.ly](#) you will be prompted to create an account that you can use for all future gifts.
- The first time you will also need to add your credit/debit card or ACH/banking info.
- Once your account has been created you won't need to enter your personal or payment information. Just enter your PIN and give!
- A reminder you have the ability to set up your gift as recurring.

OPTION C. Redeemer “Online Giving Form” on our website:

Go to www.RedemerRamsey.org and go to the “Give” menu to give through the church website using the “Online Giving Form”. It's a safe and easy way to give any time.

OPTION D. The Tithe.ly Website

Set up giving on the Tithe.ly website to give any time using your computer's internet connection. All transactions are safe and secure. Go to Tithe.ly to sign up at get.tithe.ly.

- When the Tithe.ly screen opens, click on SIGN UP FREE >
- Then select GIVE TO YOUR CHURCH
- Then select the GIVE ONLINE button
- Click the Create Account button and complete the information requested. You need to do this only the first time. You will just need to sign in after completing this screen.
- Follow the screen instructions to make your contribution.
